From the Rabbi Jack P. Paskoff

The Jewish month of Cheshvan, or Marcheshvan, as it is sometimes known, is unique in that, other than Shabbat, it's the only month without a Jewish holiday. The legend even goes that we added "Mar" to the beginning of "Cheshvan" as an indication that the month personified feels bitter at being so neglected. Let's compound the bitterness. In 1938, Kristallnacht took place during Cheshvan on November 9 and 10, and just last year, the Tree of Life shootings in Pittsburgh came during the month of Cheshvan as well (October 27, 2018). It's time for us to rescue Cheshvan from this bitterness.

In some ways, the Torah readings don't help very much. We have the destruction of the flood during Noah's day. We have the estrangement caused by the Tower of Babel. Abraham is going to banish one son and his mother, and nearly sacrifice another son, and we will witness the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah. Where is there joy to be found in Cheshvan?

For this, I turn to the American experience, with November linked most closely, but as we know, not every year, with Cheshvan. During Cheshvan this year, a number of us will make a pilgrimage to the deep south to bear witness to the struggle for civil rights in years past, and even today. We remember the history of slavery, Jim Crow, and ongoing racism today and we also know that through the constitutional amendments of the 19th century, and the Civil Rights and Voting Rights Acts of the 1960's, we saw our country and our government at their best. In Cheshvan this year, let's celebrate all that our country can be.

November is also Election Day. Each year, I think of what it means for us as Jews, less than 2% of the American population, after being denied the opportunity in too many places for too many years, now have the chance to play a direct role in government. Many of us take that for granted, having known nothing else. As a student of history, for me this is momentous.

I grew up during the Viet Nam era. While I was too young to know what the protests meant, I am very well aware of the pain that those who served in that war experienced. I'm thankful that we've transcended that, and I'm thankful to those who served and continue to serve our country. Let's remember them on Veterans' Day.

This year, Thanksgiving is the very last day of Cheshvan. As Jews, we express our thanks with each act we perform on waking in the morning, with each bit of food we put in our mouths, and 3 times a day at services for those who observe that tradition. We don't need a day to be set aside for gratitude, but what a wonderful part of the American experience for us.

Israel songwriter, Naomi Shemer z"l, asked God to guard "All These Things" in her song, Al Kol Eleh. In that song, we thank God for the bitter and the sweet. We thank God for Marcheshvan, and for November. We honor our faith, and this country that has meant so much to our people.

Sometimes we have to give more fairness to a child to make it an even scale. My example is a picture, from the front children all looking over a fence and their faces are all looking over evenly. When we look at the picture on the other side they are all standing on different size boxes. Sometimes we need to give our children a bigger box to make it fair for all.

In July, thanks to the generosity of JCAL, I was able to attend my 2nd NewCAJE conference. NewCAJE enables me to expand my skill set, not only as a Sh'arim teacher, but as a mother and as a Jew. Some favorite classes included ways of asking good questions, countering BDS in more effective ways, the basics of Nonviolent Communication (NVC) and how to incorporate protest posters at your Seder table. These all added to my tool box of life, but perhaps moreso, NewCAJE is about connections and community.

There's something to be said for coming together with a couple hundred Jewish educators and leaders from around the country. It provides one of those opportunities that most Diaspora Jews crave... that sense of not being in a room and feeling like you're "different" or "other". You don't have to wonder how that "otherness" might present itself and what the response will be from those around you as a result. Places like NewCAJE are a peaceful break from that reality... just like Camp and Sh'arim provides for our kids.

Just like at Shaarai, NewCAJE is a place where we can take a breath, come together to learn from one another, sing, nosh (not always the best food) and k'vetch (often about the food!) It's a place where we are reminded that we are one people: mishpacha (family). Our differences do not need to divide us. We can learn from those differences if we are open to listening to one another.

While I want my students to gain an understanding of what the Holocaust means to our people and I want them to develop a meaningful connection with Israel, ultimately, I hope they see the value in learning together and feel the special connection by being a part of Sh'arim each week.

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MITZVAH OPPORTUNITIES & EVENTS

I want to thank our Temple family for the generous donations that I received for McAllen, Texas. Stefanie Heller was kind enough to ship the supplies, which amounted to 173 lbs of toiletries and snacks to the border for asylum seekers.

With the donations that I received from the congregation and friends in our larger community, we were able to do the following:

Purchase 15 pop-up tents (3 and 4 person tents)

Create hygiene kits with toiletry items

Purchase razors, packages of Clorox wipes,

single packets of ibuprofen and Benadryl,

one size fits all belts.

The situation at the border is worse than one could ever imagine. To put it in perspective —think of when you might have volunteered serving a meal at a homeless shelter. That shelter would be considered a hotel for the people at the border as there is no shelter and there are no services provided in Mexico.

People seeking asylum from Central America (a tremendous number) end up in Mexico, and in the

past, would then be allowed to enter our country as asylum seekers. Now they are to remain in Mexico and apply for asylum there before entering our country. Mexico is in no way set up to provide for these people. Right across the border (where I was) were 600 individuals/families of all ages living outdoors, with no shelter, and having only two port-a-potties. Food is provided by "Team Brownsville" which is a non-profit organization committed to feeding this group of people. Go to https://www.teambrownsville.org/to learn more about what they are doing. There are 47 other points of entry which I believe are facing the same challenges; I can only refer to the border where I was.

This a crisis. It is not safe for these people: drug cartels, corrupt government officials, and organized crime groups are present with no police security of any kind. In the weeks to come, I will be working on next steps, as this crisis is not going away any time soon.
